Marion, IL—As the anticipation builds for the upcoming solar eclipse occurring on April 8<sup>th</sup>, Banterra is thrilled to announce a unique initiative to illuminate hope for critically ill children. "We provided glasses as a charity fundraiser for the solar eclipse in 2017, and we knew with its popularity and need, we would want to do it again," said Jeff May, President and CEO of Banterra Bank.
